Alternative Medicine at Palm Beach Equine Clinic

Palm Beach Equine Clinic (PBEC) offers a wide range of therapies, including alternative medicine. This type of treatment is often used in addition to traditional medicine and can be tailored to benefit a horse's performance, healing, and overall health. PBEC is proud to have skilled alternative medicine practitioners who specialize in acupuncture, veterinary medical manipulation, laser therapy, shockwave treatment, and Chinese herbal medicine.

Equine Acupuncture

Acupuncture is based on the principle that there are energetic pathways, or channels, throughout the body that influence associated internal organs and structures. Energy from these pathways surfaces at various points on the body, which are identified as acupuncture points. Extremely fine gauge needles are inserted into the selected points to stimulate them and activate the body's natural healing abilities.

Acupuncture may provide physiological effects such as pain management, gastrointestinal regulation, decreased inflammation, and increased circulation. This type of therapy can also help with chronic conditions such as anhidrosis, heaves, and behavioral issues. Each acupuncture treatment is unique for every horse; sessions typically last 45 minutes to an hour.

Herbal Medicine

Herbal, or botanical, medicine can be used to promote a horse's health and remedy a wide range of issues. The goal of Chinese herbal medicine is to treat the underlying cause of an issue and to encourage the body to heal itself instead of using synthetic medications that can only temporarily treat the symptoms.



Chinese herbal medicine can be used to address anhidrosis, help behavioral issues, and aid digestion and circulation. This type of herbal treatment is often combined with other alternative therapies such as acupuncture.

Veterinary Medical Manipulation

Veterinary medical manipulation, commonly referred to as chiropractic adjustments, is a form of manual therapy where varying amounts of pressure are applied to specific areas of a horse's body. This therapy is often focused on the vertebral column and is used to address joint issues, aid in muscular development, stimulate nerve reflexes, and reduce pain. In most cases, veterinary medical manipulation is used for high-level performance horses across all disciplines. Horses with an uneven gait, collection issues, intermittent lameness, or decline in performance may benefit from this therapy.



Laser Therapy


Laser Therapy is a safe, non-invasive treatment where a "cold" light is used to penetrate tissue structures. Laser therapy helps increase cellular activity and blood flow and enhances tissue oxygenation. Essentially, this treatment enhances the body's natural healing mechanisms to speed up the restorative process. There are four classes of lasers with different application protocols for power, duration, and wavelengths, and each one is used depending on the horse's individual condition.

Shockwave Therapy

Extracorporeal Shockwave therapy is another non-invasive treatment option that is offered at PBEC. Shockwave therapy promotes the body's ability to selfheal by targeting high-energy sound waves on the skin's surface to reach an intended tissue depth. This treatment has been known to increase blood flow, tissue regeneration, and circulation. Shockwave therapy can contribute to a successful outcome for conditions such as navicular disease, tendon injuries, ligament injuries, osteoarthritis, fractures, and wound healing.
