

USET Foundation Supports Development of Elite Jumping Athletes

he route to representing the United States in international competition can be a circuitous one, but for jumping athletes that hold that as a goal it doesn't have to be a difficult one. USET Foundation, the philanthropic partner to US Equestrian (USEF), helps support the journey from national competition to high performance sport in order to continue our country's competitive equestrian excellence on the greatest international stages.

The Platinum Performance/ USEF Show Jumping Talent Search Finals, the USEF Junior Jumper National Championships (Prix des States), FEI North American Youth Championships (NAYC), and the USEF Horsemastership Training Series are all programs along the pathway to aim athletes toward Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI)-rated competition.

Searching for Talent

With the goal of helping athletes develop and hone



skills needed to become an effective jumping athlete, USEF Talent Search Finals is a jumper-style equitation competition composed of four phases: flatwork, gymnastics, jumping over a grand prix-style course that includes a water jump, and a ride-off where the top four competitors ride each of the other three top horses. The historic results of the USEF Talent Search Finals reads like a who's who of past and present stars of jumping, including Andre Dignelli, Brianne Goutal, Richard Spooner, Lauren Hough, Lillie Keenan, Peter Lutz, Meredith Michaels-Beerbaum, McLain Ward,

and many more.

The 2023 winner of the USEF Talent Search Finals -East, Luke Jensen, noted, "To be at the top of the level among your peers and to compete in a high-pressure situation is a great way to prepare yourself for future situations. As you come through as a junior and experience this fall season, it gives you the tools you need to begin dealing with pressure, which is very important because this sport is very mental. To be able to do this and continue to learn to deal with the pressure and the mindset has been super important."

both the Prix des States
team competition, with
teams fielded by zones, as
well as an individual
competition at the national
level. NAYC provides
competitors with a first
step into international team
experience and
championship atmosphere
with four levels for athletes in
Children's, Pre-Junior, Junior,
and Young Rider divisions.

For those who are

successful at NAYC, junior and young rider teams are chosen to represent the United States at the FEI Jumping Nations CupÔ Youth Final. This year's teams competed in Belgium and brought home the team bronze in the junior division.

While it's not required that aspiring U.S. team riders participate in programs such as Talent Search, NAYC, and the Horsemastership Series, the programs do provide helpful steppingstones for athletes with their eyes on the greatest stages, particularly because U.S. athletes have less exposure to international competitions.

USEF has three coaches that provide one-on-one support for athletes in the pathway programs, including U.S. Jumping Youth Chef d'Equipe DiAnn Langer, U.S. Jumping Development Coach Anne Kursinski, and U.S. Jumping Chef d'Equipe and Technical Advisor Robert Ridland, and they are aided by Lizzy Chesson, Managing Director of Show Jumping, and Hallye Griffin, Director of FEI/High Performance Sport at USEF. Based on their experiences with the athletes and their in-depth

knowledge of the athletes' trajectories, the three coaches consistently work together to build teams that will successfully represent the U.S. in

international competition.

"We have great depth,"
Kursinski said of the upand-coming jumping talent
in the U.S., "but we don't
have [easy access to]
international experience
like the Europeans [do]. For
us, getting riders to qualify
[for NAYC] and getting that
team experience under
their belts is so important."

Developing Onto Teams

Athletes' progression onto the international stage is also part of the pathway. Athletes are selected to represent the U.S. to gain experience at the CSIO3* levels before moving up to the CSIO5* level. Simply getting overseas to compete against European teams is a crucial component of developing competitive team athletes.

A regular stop on the international calendar for developing teams are the Jumping Nations Cup



Riders who have come up through pathway programs were fielded onto teams this year, including Zayna Rizvi, Caitlyn Connors, Hannah Selleck, and Jacob Pope.

Rizvi picked up individual gold medals in the Junior and Young Rider divisions in 2021 and 2022 at the FEI North American Youth Championships, while Jacob Pope was a team gold medalist in 2015 and Caitlyn Connors won team bronze in 2017. Team veteran Hannah Selleck was individual and team. gold medalist in 2008, the same year she won the **USEF Show Jumping** Talent Search Finals -West. Pope won the East Finals in 2012.

Following a third-place podium finish, Kursinski

The Pathway Runs **Through Wellington**

The first jumping pathway program in 2024 will be the **USEF** Horsemastership Training Series running January 4-7 at Equestrian Village, home of the Adequan® Global Dressage Festival and WEF jumping events, in Wellington, Florida. The series helps identify upcoming riders as potential future U.S. jumping team athletes while also providing them with an allencompassing educational experience to promote their development.

Last year, the USEF Horsemastership Training Series had an enhanced format structure, offering both in-person and online instruction with selected athletes throughout the duration of the year. The inperson series in 2024 features four days of mounted and unmounted educational sessions with top athletes and experts in the equine industry.
